Mission Statement

The Rensselaer Plateau Alliance promotes and facilitates the protection of the Rensselaer Plateau's undeveloped and unfragmented forests. These possess many significant natural features and provide natural habitats for plants and animals; forest products, recreation and most important, water and air quality.

Presidents Message

Each year the RPA grows and builds momentum. When we first started in May 2006 we were just an ad-hoc group of people interested in somehow doing something to protect a corridor of forest on the plateau for wildlife and a recreational trail. It took the better part of a year of what were for the most part brainstorming meetings to get a real focus and a path forward. During the next year we settled on a Mission Statement, developed a PowerPoint presentation and started planning for the development of the regional conservation plan. During the next year we took our presentation to each of the 10 towns of the Plateau, incorporated and started in earnest on building relationships with our Alliance Members.

2009 was the RPA's 3rd full year and first full year after incorporating as a New York State not-for-profit corporation. During the year we continued to build working relationships with our Alliance Members and with other organizations such as Wildlands and Woodlands. Our small group of 14 all volunteer participating members, (directors) continued to grow our working relationships as we moved forward on a number of projects. This group consists of numerous professionals of varying backgrounds who possess a wide range of technical, professional and practical skills and expertise. The group includes land owners, educators, biologists, foresters, geologists, ecologists, software developers, artist, master forest owners, lawyers, engineers and research scientists.

We have done so much in a very short time and have done this on an entirely volunteer basis. We have spent very little money. We have a very dedicated, talented and capable group of volunteers. I am very grateful and honored to be working with them as we move forward building momentum for the protection of the undeveloped and unfragmented forests of the Rensselaer Plateau.

2009 Accomplishments

In February we conducted a grass-roots e-mail campaign to show support for the Plateau in the New York State, DEC Open Space Plan. Supporters were asked to write letters and send e-mails stating their support for including the Plateau as a high priority in region 4 of the Open Space Plan. From this we received word that DEC received "extensive" support for the Plateau.

We were very lucky in March when Albany Times Union reporter Brian Nearing who had been cross country skiing at Pineridge Cross Country Ski Area saw one of our brochures. Brian asked Walter Kersch, the owner of Pineridge, and our treasurer, about the brochure, the Rensselaer Plateau and the RPA. Brian felt that our mission was a worthy story and the RPA was featured on the front page of the Times Union on March 12. You can see by the Web Site Unique Visits Report later in this document that this had a tremendous impact on the visibility of our organization. There is a link to

this story on our web site on the In the Media page. Also related to this, RPA President Jim Bonesteel was interviewed by Brian Nearing on "The Capital Green Scene" on WVCR radio on March 7th.

In August, Jim Bonesteel and Walter Kersch were interviewed on the Hope for the Earth radio show on WRPI.

Ecologist Dr. David Hunt continued his volunteer work gathering info for conservation plan. He drafted reports for the Plateau boundary and matrix blocks. He completed 1st draft of comprehensive tables of rare plants and animals. He and Rachel Rieman gathered air photos for the Plateau which is the first step for making a comprehensive map of each of the 14 ecosystems of the plateau and a comprehensive natural community map for the Plateau. David completed draft one of a 1:24000 scale map of the Plateau boundary. David continues his work on a slow volunteer basis. We are hoping to raise the funds necessary by May 2010 so that we can pay him to work full time on this project.

We conducted 2 Field Days in May and one in September in which we invited the public out to Pineridge Cross Country Ski Area. These free events were about 3 hours long and were very well received. They started with a short PowerPoint presentation given by Jim Bonesteel followed by a brief question and answer period. Adult participants were then given a choice of 3 interpretive walks:

Discover Plateau Wetlands - Conservation Ecologist, David Hunt, Ph.D, who led a visit into a wetland to discover special vegetation and wildlife communities, and discussed issues that endanger their status. Hunt was also on hand to talk about the scientific foundations that underscore the importance of maintaining the integrity of this region.

Forest Management - Master Forest Owner, Walter Kersch, led a party into a section of mis-managed forest to show and discuss its effects. In addition, Kersch highlighted unique stone formations on the walk, and address the land use issue of property line markings and other forest-related topics.

Stream Ecology - Wildlife Technician, William Hoffman explored the nearby streams and discuss ecology and the wildlife that depend upon them.

Childrens's Discovery Walk - Fran Egbert and Rachel Riemann led children to the forest and streams to discover the special things found there.

On Sept 26th we cosponsored A Rural Landowners Workshop with Cornell Cooperative Extension, New York Forest Owners Association (Capital District Chapter), and the Robert Wentorf Foundation. This workshop was be held at Tamarac/Brittenkill High School, Route 2, Brunswick, NY. Topics included forestry management, selling timber, wildlife conservation, preserving property for children, enjoying forests and ponds.

Fran Egbert and Yvonne Keefe developed a new display booth with photos donated by Nate Simms and a large glossy map developed by the Hudson River Estuary Program. We had a display presence at the Grafton Winter Fest, the Taborton Environmental Fair and the Rensselaer County Fair in Scaghticoke.

In May we submitted form 1023 to the IRS and in November we received our 501(c)(3) determination as a public charity. This enabled us to start receiving donations online via NYCharities, and to take advantage of free or reduced rate services and products from Vertical Response, TechSoup and ETapestry. This also makes us eligible for a vast number of grants only available to 501(c)(3) organizations as well as making us more attractive to individual donors. In the first month after receiving our 501(c)(3) and starting to accept donations online we received as much in donations as we had received for the entire year before.


